Donald Patrick McIntyre (1916-1992) was the son of the Rev Edward A. and Clara McIntyre, both of whom served as editors of the Canadian Churchman. His interest in meteorology was expressed when graduating from Ridley College; University of Toronto in 1938 with a scholarship in mathematics. He became a founding member of the Canadian Branch of the Royal Meteorological Society.



During the Second World War, which interrupted his studies, he served as Officer-in-Charge of the weather office in Prince George, BC. In 1949 he received a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago for a dissertation *On the Barocline Structures of the Westerlies*.

Returning to the Meteorological Service he became head of Research and Training, then Director-General of Research and was a member of the Canadian delegation at the 1972 Stockholm United Nations Conference on the Human Environment.

During his terms as president of the Canadian Branch of the RMS (1953-55) he gave two addresses, *Meteorological Research and Education in Canada*, and *Meteorology - 2000 A.D.* 

After retirement, he was a consultant and helped develop the CMOS consultant accreditation program. Donald P. McIntyre died in North York on 15 October 1992.
